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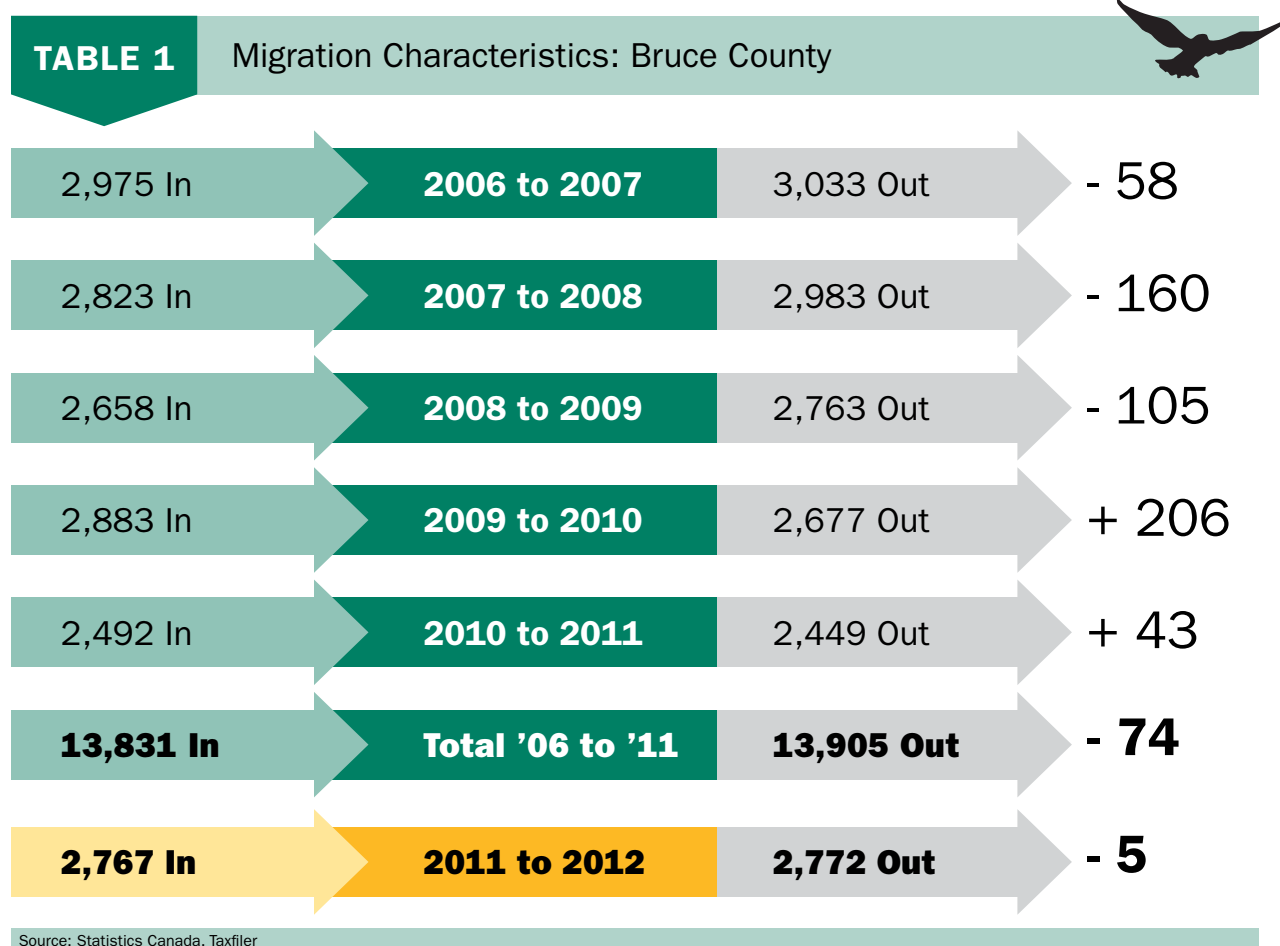
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Bruce County Migration Update

Overall, Bruce County's 2011 to 2012 migration patterns appear to be consistent with 2006 to 2011 trends.

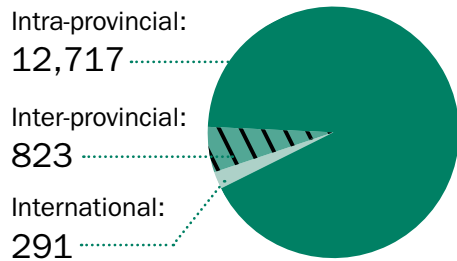
When looking specifically at the number of people who moved in and out of Bruce, 2011 to 2012 migration fell well within the range of movement in previous years. Of note, after two years of positive net migration, Bruce experienced a modest net loss of 5 people between 2011 and 2012.



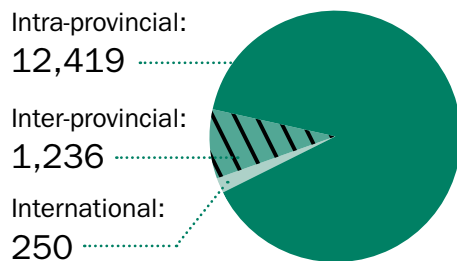
Bruce County continues to gain more people from Ontario communities (intra-provincial migration) than it losses to Ontario communities, but also continues to experience a net loss of people through inter-provincial migration.

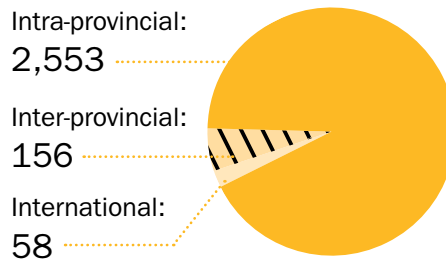

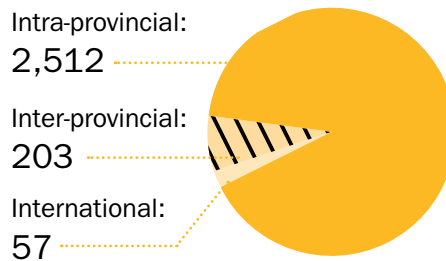
