



Manufacturing


Employment Change by Census Division 2001-2006

- 5.0 to 9.9%
- 0.0 to 4.9%
- 0.1 to -5.0%
- 5.1 to -10.0%
- 10.1 to -15.0%
- 15.1 to -20.0%

Manufacturing employment loss was severe in the Wasaga Beach, Collingwood, Clearview Township region with a drop of 18% and 675 jobs lost.


Self Employment Change

Bruce-Grey-Huron-Perth-Georgian Triangle 2001-2006



Tied to the declining agriculture sector, self-employment in this region dropped significantly between 2001 and 2006.

Employment Change by Industry, Bruce-Grey-Huron-Perth-Georgian Triangle, 2001-2006




Healthcare and social assistance led this region's employment growth with 1,560 new jobs between 2001 and 2006.

Unemployment rates in this region are significantly lower than provincial averages for all age groups. Youth age 15 to 24 continue to have an unemployment rate double that of the total population.

Employment amongst this region's men is led by farmers and followed by transport operators. The most prevalent occupations for women are other sales and service, and clerical, each employing 11%.



All Industries	18%

Agriculture and other primary along with real estate and rental and leasing are this region's oldest industries. The local transportation and warehousing sector is significantly older than the provincial average where 18% of the workforce is over age 55.


Income Composition

Similar to Ontario, a majority of this region's workforce is employed in occupations that typically pay moderately below the region's income average. A lower share of this area's workforce is employed in high income occupations compared to the province.

Education



Leading this training board region, 56% of Bruce's working age population (25-64) has a post-secondary certificate, diploma or degree. The Ontario average is 61%.



Bruce-Grey-Huron-Perth-Georgian Triangle, 2006




Architecture, engineering and related technologies is the leading field of study for this region's graduates at 26%; a higher share than the provincial average of 21%.

The population in this region without a high school diploma has decreased significantly while those with a trades certificate has dropped slightly. The number of high school, college and university graduates has increased.

The share of university and college graduates is higher for this region's younger generations. While college and trades rates are similar, the share of this region's workforce with only a high school diploma or less is higher than provincially.
